Millions of Canadians Continue to Crowd into Unemployment Offices in Search of Jobs

Companies that sell big items such as houses and cars are having a hard time because people cannot buy or make their payments on their products. In turn they cannot afford to employ so many people. Wages have dropped over the past few years but the cost of goods has declined even quicker. The outcome of this decline is a higher standard of living for property owners and those employed. The absence of spending money has resulted in a tremendous lack of jobs in our society, the unemployment rate is above 12%.

Property values in the country have dropped as people can no longer pay huge bills and the payments that go along with a property. For the majority of the population it is challenging just to pay for power, water and food. The increased crop failure in the Western provinces due to drought and plagues of grasshoppers severely crippled their economy. Additionally, they rely on the global trade market to trade their wheat, but when the market crashed, they were unable to sell to anyone further damaging their economy.

A great number of teenagers have left home in hopes of a better life riding the rails. One teen, Sandy Snow says "I hope to find work in Toronto." About one in 5 Canadians have become reliant on government assistance to stay alive. Canada's population growth has fallen due to both low birth rates and little immigration. Many people in society have been thrown into poverty.
